

"THE LAKE THAT TIME FORGOT"

Eagle Lake is 5,115 feet above sea level. It is thirteen miles long and four miles wide, the second largest body of water in California (not including Lake Tahoe which lies partly in Nevada.) The lower half of the lake lies in a forest and the upper half is partially desert.

The Eagle Lake trout, or Silver Trout as they are called, are unlike any other trout in the world. The Kokanee Salmon were planted by the California State Department of Fish and Game, and several hundred thousand more are to be planted this year. There are a large number of Cormorants that make their home on the lake. Antelope may be seen in the vicinity as well as Mule Deer.

Section 65.5 of the California Agricultural Code requires that the Agricultural Commissioner compile a report covering conditions, acreage, production, and value of the Agricultural products of his county.

This eleventh annual report is the gross prices received by the farmers of this county for their commodities. The figures shown herein are based on the average gross return to the farmer.

The 1954 income decreased approximately \$2,317,356.48. This decrease was due mostly to the drop in production of lumber, and the number of livestock sold compared to last year. Due to a late freeze the commercial apple crop was completely destroyed. The acreage in potatoes was higher but the production was much less due also to the late freeze.
